

Dreamcatchers are an important part of Indigenous culture. This picture is more than 100 years old.



A dreamcatcher traps bad dreams but lets good dreams pass through.



Montana uses sinew, a metal ring, a feather, a bead and leather lacing to make the dreamcatcher.





Sinew and leather lacing are often made from deer.



She wraps the leather lacing around the ring.



Montana weaves the web with sinew.



She adds a bead to the web.



She clamps a feather to the bottom.



The dreamcatcher is ready.
